

# Volunteering for WHR track work - Your questions answered

## What do I need if I come?

**Clothing:** You need work clothes including safety boots and work gloves. It is for the supervisor to decide if hard hats have to be worn. If so they will be provided. On straight forward track work they are not normally needed.

**Hi-vis:** Hi-vis must be worn on site. The correct colour is orange. The waistcoat type is quite adequate and can be purchased for under a fiver. It is preferable for volunteers to bring their own as our stock of loan items is very small.

**Waterproofs:** It is wise to bring a waterproof jacket or coat and trousers. We work when it rains as well as when the sun shines. Many volunteers have acquired a hi vis waterproof jacket.

The working day usually starts at about 8:30 and finishes at around 4:30 to 5 pm. The supervisor will tell you what the joining arrangements are. For most volunteers who come from a distance and intend to join a weekend working party that means they need a bed in the locality on Friday and Saturday nights. Some people stay on into the following week and make their services available for other duties. For example the P-Way gang can usually make good use of extra pairs of hands.

**Accommodation:** There are a number of bunk houses and some hostel type accommodation in the area as well as B&Bs and guest houses. I have a list for those who need one. Volunteers may also be able to stay at the Minffordd Hostel operated for the Ffestiniog Railway but it is essential to book in advance as sometimes the hostel can be oversubscribed. I am always pleased to receive information about suitable accommodation either from volunteers who have stayed in a place or from proprietors who offer it.

Before you come for the first time please complete the volunteer information form and return it to me at the Dinas Construction Office. You can download the form from [http://www.whrsoc.org.uk/Projects/Images/Volunteer Information Form.pdf](http://www.whrsoc.org.uk/Projects/Images/Volunteer%20Information%20Form.pdf) On your first visit you will be taken through a short induction, mainly concerned with health and safety aspects so, please, get there on time. You need to be inducted before you can work on site.

Please "book" your visit as far ahead as possible. Do not simply turn up without advance notice. We need to know how many people can be expected so that the work can be planned. So get in touch beforehand by phone, email or letter. Remember to "sign on" when you arrive.

Finally, on the day, don't forget your lunch and bring plenty of enthusiasm with you. We provide the tea and coffee. However you may want to bring a flask with you against the possibility that the mess coach is some way away from where we are working and you want refreshment without having to go back to the mess coach.

And one more point. I am afraid that normally we cannot take volunteers who have not reached their sixteenth birthday.
